Preamble to inspectors' report

any relevant information or comments from the pre-inspection audit. Dublin Zoo was founded 190 years ago and is governed by the Council of the Zoological Society of Ireland. It is situated on a 28 hectare site in Phoenix Park near the centre of Dublin. In 2021, Dublin Zoo published a strategic vision document 'Dublin Zoo 200' which outlines the Zoo's ambitious 10 year vision, as the zoo approaches their bicentennial in 2031. The inspectors look forward to following the progress of the zoo development during this exciting time. As scheduled for the 2023 inspection, and in order to review the detailed conservation, education and research outputs in greater detail, the zoo inspection took place over 1.5 days rather than the typical 1 day.

The inspectors would like to thank all the zoo personnel involved for their welcome and cooperation during the inspection. From zoo director to volunteers, the inspectors found all individuals to be friendly, honest and willing to engage in the process.

Time was allocated to specifically assess the conservation, research and education departments on this inspection. This is not undertaken at every inspection as the inspectorate focuses on animal welfare and related aspects of zoo management.

The zoo appointed their first full time Conservation and Research Officer in November 2021, and following this they published their Conservation Master Plan (2022-2031). The focus is on the ambition of Dublin Zoo to become a zoo based-conservation organisation, rather than a zoo that partakes in conservation. There is clearly a lot of passion within the zoo team for this, at all levels. The zoo is working towards becoming an IUCN National Centre for Species Survival, and is also closely involved in native wildlife projects. There are plans to employ a second full time officer within conservation and research within the zoo, along with initiation of a intern programme. The inspectors would like to congratulate the zoo on taking these leading steps, and are very much looking forward to following the Master Plan over the coming years.

The inspectors spent a number of hours assessing the Education department during this visit, where they were provided with an overview of the 2023-2031 Conservation Education Master Plan. The facilities, education programme and team were outstanding. There is clear passion in this department for not only providing the basics of zoo education to children and adult visitors, but also extending this to social action campaigns and educating school teachers. The inspectors were very impressed with the infectious enthusiasm and passion exhibited by the Head of Discovery and Learning.

As always it is excellent to see continued progress in the infrastructure of the site, with the new painted dog and bongo houses, and the ongoing build of a second rhino house.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. A review should be undertaken of the dietary components, access to food items and presentation within the mixed South America primate exhibits to ensure that each species is consuming a species appropriate diet. At present this relates to the mixed howler and squirrel monkey exhibit, but should also include the saki monkeys as it is proposed that they will all share the same space in future.
- 2. It it recommended that the sheep netting at the elephant enclosure is removed, given the blackbuck no longer access this area. If a barrier is required for the blackbuck then this netting should be replaced or repaired such that is appropriate and safe for the animals within the enclosure.
- 3. It is recommended that the Burmese python enclosure be reviewed to ensure that the space is being maximised through the use of additional theming and that the animals are able to meaningfully stretch out; this may require accurate assessment of their length.
- 4. It is recommended that worn & damaged paint lines used to demarcate safe spaces in hazardous animal housing are repainted and clearly visible where they are required.
